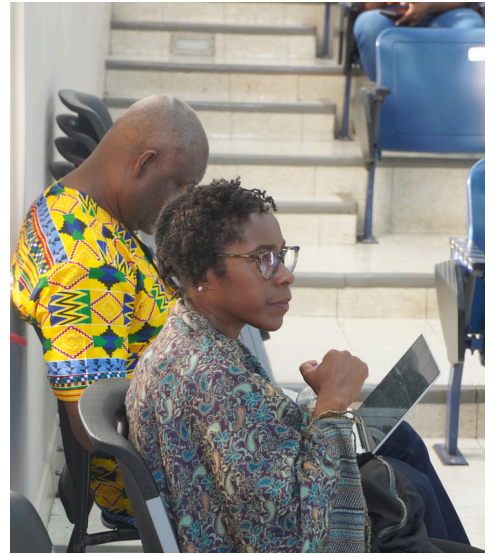

EVENING EVENT: BARBERSHOP TALK SERIES

The evening event hosted a three-hour in-person and virtual Barbershop Talks series panel discussions at the University of The West Indies Cave Hill (UWI), St. Michael Barbados. The evening event focused on providing Black community members and the broader community with the opportunity to talk about mental health issues openly and safely with mental health professionals by creating a safe space for Black people of different and respected lived experiences.

The discussions raised awareness about the broad spectrum of mental health issues that affect Black men and boys and how to reduce the stigmas associated with mental illness. The event was well attended both in-person and online. Three professional barbers were present all day to provide free haircuts for about 30+ in-person participants. In addition, free chair massages were also provided.

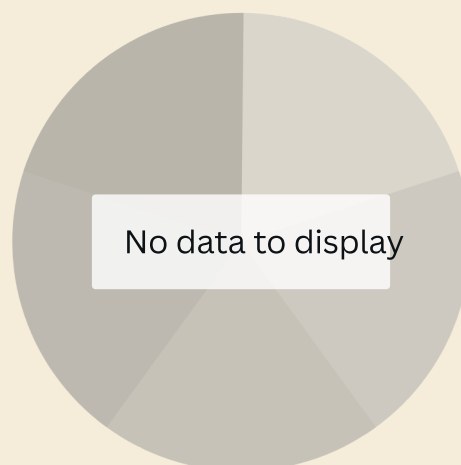

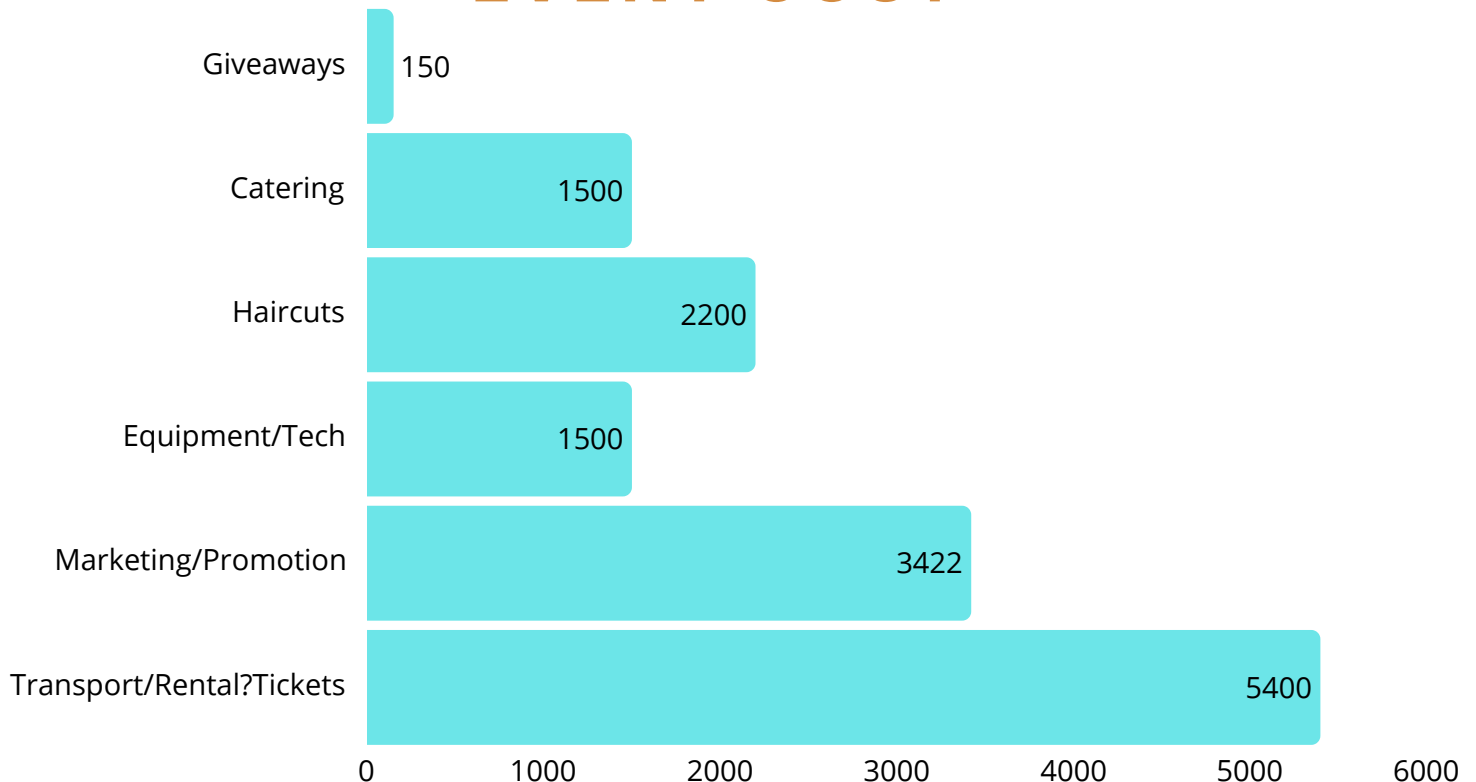
