OUR MISSION

THE BARBERSHOP TALK SERIES

Our goal is to create a secure and empowering environment that encourages enriching conversations that socially and politically empower Black men and boys. We are dedicated to promoting dialogue among Black men and boys regarding various themes such as gender biases and anti-Black racism, all of which create moments of learning and awareness regarding Black masculinities.



The Afro-Caribbean Mentorship Program (ACMP)

Founded in 2018, the Afro-Caribbean Mentorship Program aims to support the unique needs of Black students in academic spaces.

ACMP provides a safe, culturally sensitive learning space, with Black scholarship focusing on Black students' academic and social development.

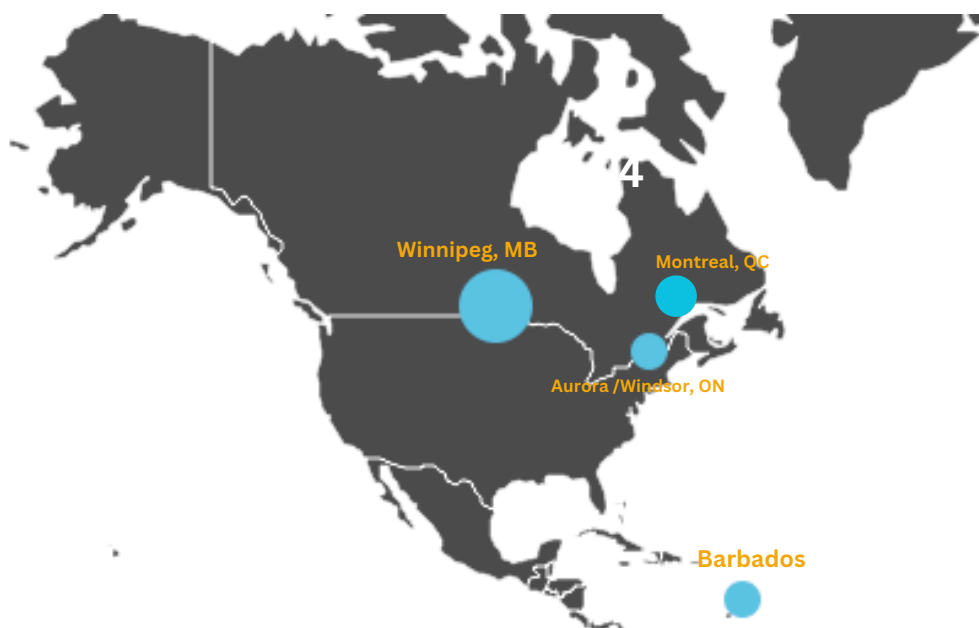
Although ACMP events and programs are catered for Black students, all students and community members from differing racial and ethnic backgrounds are encouraged to participate and engage in the spirit of solidarity.

Events such as Financial Literacy (Partnered with TD Bank), Anti-Black Racism as Mental Health Concern, More Than Networking and the famous Black History Month event empower Black youth and broader Canadian communities while intentionally humanizing Black people and their multi-faceted cultural experiences.



ABOUT OUR EVENT

Many Black men share a deep and meaningful relationship with their barbers. The connection between Black men and boys and their barbers has inspired the creation of Barbershop Talks: Black Men and Misconception. These events leverage the familiar and welcoming atmosphere of the neighbourhood barbershop to establish a safe space for Black men and boys to engage and discuss many themes which rarely get spoken about in mainstream society. Themes such as addressing mental health concerns that are specific to Black men and boys have been well-received among audience members as the conversation disallows homogenizing people with mental health concerns. Instead, people participating in the program are encouraged to engage through an intersectional approach to critically understand what mental health means when coupling anti-Blackness, gender biases and event classism as causes for mental health issues among Black men and boys.



PREVIOUS EVENTS



Addressing Mental Health of Barbadian Men and Boys

This event provided a safe space for Black men and boys and the broader Barbadian community members to engage in conversations about the mental health of Black men and boys - With an emphasis on thinking through ways to address and support Black men and boys. With expert panelists and interactive discussions, this event successfully empowered Black men and boys to seek help and build supportive relationships within their community.

Utilizing the Barbershop Setting to Discuss and Challenge Anti-Black Racism

Hosted as a workshop during the 2024 Canadian Sociological Association (CSA) Congress Conference. It encouraged our Canadian and international Black community and non-Black community to speak with one another while creating a space to appreciate and learn about the varying impacts that anti-Blackness creates among Black Canadians.

Addressing the Importance of Mentors for Canadian Black Males

Despite the benefits of mentorship, many Black youth face various obstacles in seeking positive guidance. This often significantly harms their emotional well-being. The May 27th event created a safe space for discussion, allowing the community to explore ways to establish meaningful mentorship opportunities for young Black male youth.

Creating Safe Space for Black Men and Boys

The tragic death of a young Nigerian student by Winnipeg Police highlights the ongoing negative perception of Black men and boys as dangerous and disposable. The event focused on discussing culturally sensitive support for young Black men and boys in a time of need due to the senseless shooting of a young University of Manitoba Nigerian student at the beginning of 2024.

Supporting Black Men & Boys in Formal Education

This event focused on socio-economic barriers faced by young black boys in the Canadian formal education system. Many young Black boys are viewed as troublemakers, and not smart enough to belong to formal learning institutions. This event explored ways to support Black young men and boys, and their families, while they embark on the 2023-2024 school year.
