



OUR MISSION

The Afro-Caribbean Mentorship Program (ACMP) is an initiative dedicated to supporting the success of African, Caribbean, Black (ACB) and other racialized undergraduate and graduate students on campus, while encouraging them to be confident members of Canadian society.

We recognize that the experiences of ACB and other racialized people encounter racism, such as anti-black racism, and other forms of discrimination, that impede upon their social development as students.

The Afro-Caribbean Mentorship Program

Founded in 2018, the Afro-Caribbean Mentorship Program aims to support the unique needs of racialized students in academic spaces. As the first program of its kind at Carleton University, ACMP has expanded to base its programs in support of the Black Manitoban Community.

ACMP provides safe spaces for racialized students to connect with professionals and community members, and learn from their experiences. Our events are open to all students and community members, and offer resources and support catered for ACB students.

Events such as financial literacy, networking, and healthy relationship discussions not only help students to further their academic and professional careers but also give them a safe space for community discussion.

The ACMP also works closely with local high-schools with the hopes of encouraging young ACB students while supporting their academic endeavors. Supporting the ACMP helps to bridge the gaps between high-schools and universities while uplifting racialized students.



ABOUT OUR EVENT

The Afro Caribbean Mentorship Program (ACMP) and the University of Manitoba Black Alliance (UMBA) hosted its third annual, one-day (in-person & online) Black History Month (BHM) event. The evening's festivities celebrated Afro-Caribbean Black Canadian communities' by paying homage to our history and celebrating Afro-Caribbean Black (ACB) people's great accomplishments in our present times.

The evening's social gathering encourage audience members to dance, sing and contribute to a thought-provoking panel discussion on the Black experiences in Winnipeg, empowering our ACB community members, and supporting local Black Businesses and Initiatives.




ATTENDANCE


