On February 7, 2025, ACMP, in partnership with the University of Manitoba and Red River College Polytech, hosted its 3rd Annual Anti-Black Racism & Mental Health Event.



Themed "Working in Solidarity," the event featured keynote speaker Dr. Wendell Nii Laryea Adjetey and a diverse panel who explored the mental health impacts of racism, the power of representation, and the need for collective healing.

In March, ACMP hosted A Soulful Sanctuary Self-Care Session, an afternoon designed to empower Black women by creating a peaceful space to explore self-care strategies and discuss personal well-being. The event emphasized self-love, healing, and resilience, acknowledging the unique challenges Black women often face. Through meaningful conversations, shared experiences, and guided self-care practices, attendees explored ways to nurture their minds, bodies, and spirits. This gathering is more than just self-care as a trend, but as a powerful, life-changing practice that strengthens both individuals and communities. **Dr. Rhonesha Blaché**, a seasoned educator and advocate, led the session, focusing on reclaiming personal power and making well-being a priority. The event encouraged participants to reflect, reconnect, and remember that taking care of oneself is not a luxury, but a necessity. 25 participants were in attendance.

CHANGING THE NARRATIVE BOOK CLUB

Founded in 2023, Changing the Narrative is a book club dedicated to supporting students in exploring Black literature and engaging with Black academic thought. Over the past academic year, the club hosted 12 meetings, creating a space where students could connect, exchange ideas, and foster a sense of community. With an average attendance of 5-7 members, discussions covered a diverse range of topics, including Pan-Africanism, linguistics, medieval history, music, and influential figures such as Thomas Sankara and Bob Marley. Through this initiative, we aim to recenter Black stories and academic thought—not just for the sake of representation, but to inspire healing, joy, and empowerment. Changing the Narrative is a platform for strengthening Black imagination, building hope, and supporting one another in a space of our own making.










LOOKING AT THE MAN IN THE MIRROR CONFERENCE- BARBADOS



The Barbershop Talk Series Conference Black Men and Boys, Misconceptions, and Mental Health: Looking at the Man In The Mirror (academic and community) in Barbados was a unique platform designed to address the mental health challenges faced by Black men and boys, particularly within the Caribbean context.

"Empowering Black men and boys through dialogue, about mental health, and community"

We explored critical issues such as vulnerabilities, emotional language, fatherhood, and societal expectations. The Barbershop Talk Series Conference invited both University scholars and community advocates to contribute to the conversation on mental health, societal expectations, and the social experiences of Black men and boys. The event challenged stereotypes, addressed mental health issues, and fostered dialogue that promoted the well-being of Black males.

HIGH SCHOOL INITIATIVES



As part of ACMP's high school engagement efforts, the High School Coordinators organized an outreach initiative focused on supporting students in their transition to post-secondary education. This involved collaboration with selected local high schools to provide both a social and educational experience that would guide students through the application process.

Tabling Outreach

Prior to our main events, the High School Coordinators hosted a tabling session at both participating high schools to promote upcoming opportunities. We shared information about ACMP, answered student questions, distributed flyers, and encouraged participation in our main workshop and meet-and-greet. This event helped raise awareness and drive engagement among students who might benefit from post-secondary planning support.



Meet & Greet Sessions

Three meet-and-greets were hosted to introduce the High School initiative and our purpose to students and teachers from Grant Park High School, Dakota Collegiate, and University of Winnipeg Collegiate. Food and drinks were provided, creating a welcoming space for students to socialize, build connections, and become familiar with ACMP's role in supporting their educational journey. These events helped set a positive tone for deeper engagement during the main session.

"How to Get Into Post-Secondary School" Workshop

The main event focused on preparing students for the next step in their academic careers. The session covered key topics, including how to research academic programs, understand application requirements, write personal statements, and apply for financial aid and scholarships. Coordinators aimed to equip students with the necessary tools to independently explore post-secondary options, demonstrating how to access information and navigate various post-secondary websites. Grant Park students then had the opportunity to practice what they had learned by exploring the websites of the top three schools and programs to which they wish to apply. Students aimed to find the requirements for application and prospective deadlines for the programs. Resources were distributed, and coordinators were available to answer questions and offer one-on-one support. The event saw an enthusiastic turnout, with 25 students in attendance, eager to learn and engage with the resources provided.

Students responded positively to the event, expressing that the guidance provided helped demystify the application process and gave them greater confidence about their future steps. The combination of a casual meet-and-greet with a structured workshop allowed students to feel both socially and academically supported.

Selected students were provided with funds to apply for Colleges/Universities of their choice.





Facilitating Student-Led Black History Month Event Planning

ACMP collaborated with Grant Park's Black History Month Committee (BHMC) and Dakota Collegiate's IBPOC Committee to support them in their long-standing tradition of Black History Month celebrations. ACMP's goal was to aid students in their initiative to better understand Black narratives, worldviews and historical contexts by freely sharing ideas and perspectives.

Throughout the planning stage, we assisted students in organizing performances, panel discussions, and various other celebrations by promoting events, planning logistics, and providing resources.

ACMP held regular meetings from December through February. Over 41+ students participated during these meetings. Additionally, **ACMP provided \$1000 in funding**, which students used to support various Black History Month events and initiatives. Several events, such as Culture Day, Jazz Cafe, Panel Discussion, and Afro-Night, were successfully hosted throughout the month of February as a result of the hard work and dedication of Grant Park's BHMC.





THEATRE OF THE OPPRESSED

The public-facing performance purposely addressed social oppression(s) that was displayed through performing arts. Theatre of the Oppressed was a theatrical game in which a problem, or symptom of oppression, is presented in an unsolved form. Dramatic action will revolve around a selected issue of social inequality involving visible oppressors and an oppressed protagonist.

This was a colloaboration between students at the **University of Manitoba**, **Dakota Collegiate and Windsor Park Collegiate**.









BARBERSHOP TALK SERIES



Our goal was to create a secured and empowering environment that encouraged enriching conversations that socially and politically empower Black men and boys. We dedicated to promoting dialogue among Black men and boys regarding various themes such as gender biases and anti-Black racism, all of which created moments of learning and awareness regarding Black masculinities. We organized events in various cities across the country and the Caribbean.
